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<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Output from current longwall S2A has improved towards the end of the block, with slightly thicker seam and smaller stone band, improving throughput at the Coal Handling Prep Plant (CHPP).</li> <li>Roadway development progressing well for future longwall blocks.</li> <li>Major engineering outage completed in February, some cracks found in one main fan impellor cover which were repaired at the time, main transformer replaced. Section of the workforce utilised on community projects during the outage.</li> <li>Major projects drawing to conclusion:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Gas drainage plant – commissioning ongoing</li> <li>Waste Water Treatment Plant – commissioning ongoing</li> <li>Noise mitigation works - ongoing</li> </ul> </li> <li>Coal price in the last 3 months has been slowly decreasing, now at around \$308/t USD, as supply and demand stabilise.</li> </ul> <p><b>8.2. Tahmoor South Mine Plan:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Drawing close to the end of Longwall South 2A</li> <li>Longwall relocation to South 3A will commence in March, with S3A to commence late April</li> <li>Longwall S3A shortened slightly due to geological and gas constraints in the latter stages of development works               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>CM asked about the geological issues faced and decision to shorten Longwall S3A. PV advised there is a series of very small geological faults which made it difficult to drill the roadways and hence the start position of S3A was shortened away from the faults.</li> <li>NP asked what happens if more faults are discovered as mining commences. PV advised that depending on the fault size, we can generally continue mining and install more supports as required.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Development mining in maingate for Longwall S3A (MG3A panel) (first workings, no subsidence)</li> <li>Development mining in maingate for Longwall S4A (MG4A panel) (first workings, no subsidence)</li> <li>Development mining in 500 mains panel for Longwall S5A (first workings, no subsidence)</li> <li>Installing conveyor for maingate of Longwall S5A               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>WS asked what the intention is for future mining in Bargo. GFG Alliance greater business update:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>CN30 – GFG Alliance’s ambition to make steel manufacturing sustainable by 2030.</li> <li>Steel manufacturing accounts for up to 8% of global CO2 emissions.</li> <li>Global demand for steel is expected to double by 2050.</li> <li>Governments are setting ever more demanding legal limits to reduce GHG emissions.</li> <li>GFG is transitioning away from traditional blast furnaces used for steelmaking and have purchased an Electric Arc Furnace for Whyalla to be able to make Greensteel. Whyalla have now closed their coke ovens and will import coke for a short period of time.</li> <li>GFG approach is to mine Magnetite pellets which feed into a Direct Reduction Iron (DRI) Processing Hub. 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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• KM asked if there will be an increase in the mine subsidence compensation money set aside of \$14M for damages if more houses will now be impacted as a result of an additional longwall, commenting the amount was pitiful.</li> <li>• AB advised that Tahmoor Coking Coal does not have a capped amount of compensation money set aside for subsidence claims. The \$14M referenced in the Tahmoor South EIS was an indicative figure calculated based on previous claim studies done in the Southern coal fields. As claims are lodged and then assessed by government agency, Subsidence Advisory NSW, the coal mine is instructed to pay the assessed compensation amount for the claim. Once all Tahmoor South mining is complete, compensation paid by Tahmoor Coking Coal for claim damages may be more or may be less than the indicative figure calculated in the EIS. Furthermore, only an additional 10 properties will be located within the 20mm subsidence of LW S7A.</li> <li>• NP asked can properties experience damage if they are located outside of the 20mm predicted subsidence zone.</li> <li>• AB advised that on very rare occasions non-conventional subsidence movements or far-field movements can be experienced. Tahmoor will be the first mine in Australia to do this, however Moolarben Coal Operations will commence storing their on-site brine in historical underground workings in 2027.</li> <li>A conceptualisation schematic of where the brine water will be disposed of in the Western Domain underground workings coal seam was displayed. CW explained that the extensive groundwater modelling conducted prior to approval of this disposal method demonstrates that the brine plume will not penetrate the upper Hawkesbury Sandstone, which is the layer where privately-owned boreholes are drilled to.</li> </ul> <p><b>11.6. Water Treatment Plant (WTP)</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Committee members took a site tour of the WTP prior to the meeting commencing.</li> <li>The WTP is operational, currently fine-tuning processes and operation of the plant.</li> <li>Initial results are showing positive outcomes (ie. achieving requirements without the use of Stage 3 RO processing).               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>KM asked where the brine water was going. Brad Elvy, WTP Project Manager advised that currently no water is being disposed of underground and the brine water is being pumped into the coal mine onsite dams.</li> <li>KM asked when did SIMEC get approval to dispose of brine water underground. CW advised this was approved in the Modification 2 application granted on 13 June 2023.
