Nicole Pearce <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Asked what is happening at Wellers Road bridge. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ AB advised we have recently installed subsidence monitoring GNSS units and survey pegs as per the Infrastructure Management Plans in preparation for the upcoming longwalls. Wellers Road bridge is outside of the subsidence zone for the A series longwalls, however the NSW Resources Regulator requires the monitoring of all far field bridges as a precautionary measure. • Asked what are the holes filled in on Remembrance Drive near the petrol station. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ AB advised they were core samples taken to form part of the geotechnical investigation to assist with the design for the final repair of Remembrance Drive where the humps formed from subsidence. • Asked was there any damage to the petrol station. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ AB advised there has been no damage to the petrol tanks and these are monitored and tested on a regular basis to verify integrity as part of the Management Plan. There have been some minor subsidence impacts noticed at the petrol station property however no claim has been lodged at this stage. 	NOTE		06/06/24

Karen Moss <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Asked out of the 22 homes to be destroyed, can you specify which ones they are. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ AB advised that until subsidence occurs at a property and an assessment is made on the category of damage, it is unknown which properties may see no damage, minor damage or significant damage. For this reason, there is no identified list of properties in Bargo that may experience significant damage. The figures quoted in the EIS report are predictions based on studies of previously mined areas. We may see a reduced number of homes with significant impact, maybe none, 5 or 10. It is unknown until subsidence occurs and damage is assessed. During the claim assessment process is when properties are given an R0 to R5 damage category and this determines whether the coal mine is directed to offer property purchase or compensation to rebuild. In Tahmoor, 8 out of around 2000 homes were offered purchase or rebuild. • Asked what happens if a large home requires a rebuild, do we have to rebuild a smaller home as per current subsidence guideline regulations. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ AB advised the compensation for rebuilding a home is based on like for like replacement of what is pre-existing, so it is based on the size of the home that was damaged. • Asked who fixes the issues with increased slopes from subsidence or water drainage issues. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ AB advised that if any land undulations form or water drainage issues occur, this is factored into the claim assessment and compensation process. There is also a Land Management Plan in place. • Asked about the Non-Disclosure Agreement (Deed of Release) 	NOTE		06/06/24

8. Mining Operations Update – Mine Update (presented by Peter Vale)				
8.1. Mine Update: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Production has been consistent since the commencement of longwall S3A, with slightly thicker seam and smaller stone band, improving throughput at the Coal Handling Prep Plant (CHPP). Roadway development progressing well for future longwall blocks. Application for additional Longwall South 7A submitted in May. Investigations into carbon emission reduction strategies ongoing, with focus on VAM as well as conversion of extracted gas to electricity. Major projects drawing to conclusion: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Gas drainage plant – commissioned Waste Water Treatment Plant – commissioning ongoing Coal price in the last 3 months has been consistent at around \$240/t USD, as supply and demand stabilise. 				
8.2. Tahmoor South Mine Plan: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Longwall South 2A was completed on 6 April 2024. Relocation to Longwall South 3A was completed on 8 May 2024 and mining commenced. Development mining in maingate for Longwall S4A (MG4A panel) (first workings, no subsidence) Development mining in 505 panel adjacent to 100 panel main roadways, to assist with ventilation from Tahmoor South (first workings, no subsidence) Development mining in 500 mains panel for Longwall S6A (first workings, no subsidence) Installing conveyor for maingate of Longwall S5A <ul style="list-style-type: none"> JJ asked what size the roadways are. PV advised they are 5.5m wide and 2.7m high (roughly the meeting room size). MM asked if roadway development can continue in anticipation of S7A. PV advised we must have approval in place first. Pending on the approval timeframe, the company is considering whether to mine the B series after S6A and then come back and mine S7A. MM asked what the thickness of the coal seam is. PV advised the current thickness ranges from 1.5 - 1.8m. B series longwall thickness ranges from 1.8 – 3.2m. Our equipment operates up to 2.6m. If we wanted to mine a thicker seam, new equipment would need to be acquired that has the capacity to do so. NP asked if any more faults had been found during the mining of LW S3A.
